#### **GOVERNOR'S CORNER**

Burlington was a blast! Forty-four Southwest Section members were registered to attend the 2025 International Conference hosted by the New England Section, and a number of them flew themselves to Burlington. Our hostesses made sure the Hospitality Room was full of "local" treats and even managed to have Ben and Jerry's come and serve ice cream in the Fly Mart after the Business Meeting on Saturday.

While it is fun to attend the conferences, meet old friends, and make new ones, the focus is the annual meeting. This year, members were presented with two amendments to the bylaws and one to the Standing Rules.

- 1. The definition of a "Woman". After a lengthy debate, the motion did not pass. The Ninety-Nines will continue admitting members as they have in the past.
- 2. The definition of a "Pilot". There was much discussion regarding this topic also. This amendment requires that a "pilot" is physically on board and able to directly control the aircraft. This amendment passed.
- 3. The International Board voted to increase membership dues \$10 across the board beginning August 1. An amendment was proposed to exempt student pilots from the dues increase. The amendment to the amendment passed. The increase for other members was ratified; student pilots will not see an increase for their first two years as a student pilot.

Claudia Assmussen, San Diego Chapter Chair, was in the meeting room very early Saturday morning to tape key flags to the undersides of the tables. The key flags are reminders for the members who were in Burlington that the **2026** International Conference will be hosted by the Southwest Section in San Diego, July 8-12.

As a Section, we are asking for every chapter's help to create the best International Conference possible. We are **looking for volunteers** to host the Hospitality Room, suggestions for speakers (see the article elsewhere in the Southwesterly), and sponsors. Start making your plans now! We will be staying at the Westin Gaslamp Quarter Hotel in downtown San Diego.

Our Monterey Bay Chapter is in the final stages of preparation for the 2025 Fall Southwest Section Meeting. They have some great events lined up, including a tour of the Joby Aviation Facility, where electric vertical takeoff and landing aircraft are being developed, and a kayak tour of Monterey Beach and Harbor. The Section Meeting is being held from October 3 - 5 in Seaside, California. The Palomar Chapter is hosting our annual Winter Workshop at the Courtyard Marriott in Carlsbad, CA. Topics are: Leadership and Effective Speaking and Fundraising: What works best? Mark January 31st, 2026, on your calendars! Registration will be available soon.

## The Ninety-Nines, Inc International Conference, Burlington, Vermont ~Irene Engard

#### Below are a few reasons why I attend our conferences:

I attend for the camaraderie. Within the Ninety-Nines, we make lasting relationships. At this conference, I roomed with a former OC 99, Sue Ballew, who is currently a CFI in Palo Alto and with the Santa Clara Valley Chapter of the Ninety-Nines. Attending an International Conference allows me to see longtime

friends from outside the Southwest Section and new friends are added to my 99s family from all over the world. Indeed, you never know when one of these "family" members is the one who assists you in a time of need or enhances a visit to some area.

In Burlington, the Hospitality Suite was a great place to sit and chat with other members. And, the hosts of this conference outdid themselves providing a taste of New England. Here are just a few of the things that we experienced:

I attend to experience new areas. Burlington is a very walkable town. There is a pedestrian street (car-free zone) that has delightful shops and eateries, which was an easy walk from the conference hotel. I attend for the education. Our opening day keynote address was given by Colonel Laura Caputo, USAF. She reminded us that the Ninety-Nines provide infinite Resources and Relationships. She also reminded us that time is finite. Remember to write it down, schedule dedicated time and take small steps.

Our welcome reception speaker was Brian Kleppner, the Burlington Representative in the Vermont Legislature and Amelia Earhart's great-nephew (Muriel Earhart Morrissey's grandson). He told many great stories and even brought the huge family bible with Amelia's birth recorded. This is the first time this book has been shared with the public.

Further education led us to the *Leadership Roundtable*, where I sat with Iowa and four New England Chapters. It is important to note that there is a Chapter Chairman Roundtable every 4th Wednesday of each month at 5:30 Pacific time. This is nationwide. We also had the following *Educational Seminars* available to us:

- Celeste Pearce (AA First Officer)—B777 to the Afghan Rescue, 9/2021. She shared the event of her lifetime, flying this life-saving mission. Total Evacuees: 5349—Total missions: 26—Legs flown: 102—Employees involved: 600+.
- Aileen Watkins shared her story from Private Pilot in 1989 to Boeing 767 Captain, assisted by the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship fund. She co-founded the Past Winners/Pay it Forward Scholarship. Aviafion for a Cause Beth White: Women Build Planes. Check it out: www.habitafforaviafion.org What a story!!!!
- Aviation for a Cause Kelli O'Donnell: Turtles Fly Too! Check it out: hftps://www.turtlesflytoo.org/learn
- Flying to Greenland Minnetta Gardinier: Fascinating journey in truly remote flying. Example: Stop for gas, you buy the whole 55 gal drum. You bring your own pump and put your name on the drum so you can use it on the return trip. (I think we could invite her to present this as a future educational chapter Zoom meeting.)



*I attend for the annual business meeting.* Our *Annual Business Meeting* was also held at this conference and I attended as the Orange County Chapter Representative. At our annual business meeting:

- Each attendee carries one vote. We needed 157 voting members present either in person or on Zoom for a quorum. We had 192 (including 30 online).
- There were lots of reports and even more information.
- Two bylaw changes were highlighted:

  \*Clarifying how Oos will define "Morne

  \*Clarify in the content of th
  - \*Clarifying how 99s will define "Woman". Although I thought this was a nobrainer (how a person idenfifies oneself), it failed to achieve a 2/3rds vote. There was a lot of good discussion with a final vote of 100 for and 85 against.
  - \*Defining "Pilot". Basically excluding drone pilots. Wow so many great discussions that I changed my vote. The amendment needed a 2/3rds vote to pass, which was 129 votes. Final tally 129 for and 55 against. It passed. Our chapter bylaws are not affected by the amendment passed.
- Ratification of Standing Rules Amendment Dues increase. There were lots of comments, mostly concerning student pilots. An amendment to the amendment was made to keep the first 2 years student membership the same. Passed 164 to 17 Amended amendment also passed 92 For 88 Opposed. Standing rules are passed with a plurality (more votes) and not a 2/3rds vote as needed for bylaws changes.

The meeting ran long, but we got business handled and members were heard.

Traveling by air is always an adventure and an opportunity to practice patience, whether you are flying yourself or flying commercially. Weather is the master and controls your movement. Thunderstorms impacted the northeast and all it takes is

one missed connection or flight cancellation to change an 8-hour trip into a 34-hour trip. It is essential to have the airline app for any carrier you might use on your phone. Using the app, I was able to book a flight on United when American had cancelled all of their flights. Then after another cancelled flight (mechanical), using the chat feature, I was able to avoid waiting for a counter agent, change my flight and got home after 34 hours instead of 42 hours on the flight that re-booked automatically.



Here are some interesting facts about Burlington:

Burlington is situated on the eastern shore of Lake Champlain, between the Adirondack Mountains of New York to the west and the Green Mountains to the east. Burlington is the most populous city in the state of Vermont. The city is located just 45 miles south of the U.S.-Canada border. Burlington was chartered by Governor Benning Wentworth of New Hampshire in 1763 and named for the Burling family, who were pioneer landowners. Burlington is home to the University of Vermont, Champlain College, and Vermont's largest hospital, the UVM Medical Center. We all scream for ice cream! Ben & Jerry's began in 1978 when Ben Cohen and Jerry Springfield opened their first ice cream shop in an old garage.

#### Choosing How To Spend My TIME and \$\$\$!

This year, I made the exciting decision to attend the Women in Aviation 2025 Conference instead of our SWS Meeting in Arizona. While it was a tough choice, I saw it as an opportunity to invest in my growth and also give back to the aviation community by volunteering - a small extra cost for a big return in inspiration and connection.

Since joining Women in Aviation and the Ninety-Nines in 2017, both organizations have been life-changing. They've opened doors, provided invaluable support, and made my journey to becoming a pilot possible without the burden of extra debt. My first conference in Long Beach, where I received the Dianne Ballweg IFR Scholarship, set the stage for years of encouragement and mentorship.

For years, I dedicated every penny, nickel and dime to flight training, putting conferences out of state on hold due to finances and single parenthood. Yet, I always dreamed of attending a full conference, knowing the power of networking in aviation. According to Investopedia.com, "Networking is the process of exchanging information and ideas among professionals to expand their connections, discover job opportunities, and stay informed about industry developments."

Being an introvert most of the time, I have to make an effort to step out of my comfort zone. This year, I finally stepped out of my comfort zone since I am just below 1500 flight hours, and the rewards were immediate: meaningful conversations with Captains from both Part 121 and Part 135 operators, made new friendships, and connections with accomplished women pilots who inspired me to aim higher.

Had it not been for my fellow 99's Nominating Committee members who, while on Zoom, took time out from the end of the 60 minutes meeting time, and beyond, to encourage me to attend the conference. No, not the South West Sectional weekend conference. They actually pointed me in the direction of Women In Aviation conference in Boulder, CO. They also assured me when I arrived there the booth would have other 99s, including board members, whom I could look forward to seeing. Mentally knowing they would be there and be my fellow aviators in a mission to fly for a living and life - was a deal breaker.

It didn't take long to convince me. Though I arrived alone, attended alone and left alone I didn't feel lonely or out of place. The main reason was because I knew where my people were - at the volunteer booths! I quickly signed up for a 99s morning volunteer session, an afternoon session with Women In Corporate Aviation, and a final morning with the Women In Aviation PR room. Beyond a shadow of a doubt, this was my favorite time at the conference.

Being behind a volunteer booth versus in front of a booth is a world of difference. There is a layer of protection - in a way that allows you to observe attendees close up, and by the way they carry themselves, shake your hand, what they speak/ask about and how they speak you can tell a lot about them in less than five minutes. This gave me an idea on how to improve my own presentation while job hunting and also becoming more compassionate towards jobseekers because it literally can be an agonizing process, especially if you don't have a strong base to run back to for support: familiarity, smiles, jokes, and encouragement on how to improve. Wow, the list is almost endless. During my solo-job-hunting-day at the conference, I had a motto: to make the rounds I had prepared, marked off, and presented all my resumes. My goal was to meet 2-3 very good job opportunities. I was not disappointed, though it was disappointing to find that most regional and small carriers were in a temporary hiring freeze.

Literally. The market slowed down a lot this year but I am not too concerned because I think I picked my future employer. They are the ones that seem to fit me the most, and checked off the most boxes - despite a horrible uniform (joke).

My grandmother, who loved the Christmas season more than any other season, made it a huge deal by buying thoughtful gifts, decorating and preparing good food. She always told me, "It is more blessed to give, than to receive." Volunteering is this! I am more blessed when I give a few hours, more than doing anything else.

Sometimes, the best decisions require us to step away from routine and embrace new opportunities. By doing so, we not only grow ourselves but also strengthen our community.

Now, more than ever, the Ninety-Nines needs passionate, talented members to lead us into the future. Our organization thrives when each member brings their unique strengths and mentors the next generation. Whether you're a seasoned pilot or just starting, your time and commitment can make a real difference. Consider stepping up for a two-year term, sharing your experience, and helping shape our section and/or a chapter for the future.

At the WAI conference, I was amazed by the energy and ambition of very young women entering aviation today. While I sometimes wish I'd started sooner, I know I can give back by guiding and encouraging others. While our goal was to inspire the next generation of aviators, we left the event equally inspired by their passion and potential.
