Back to the Future

With the Antelope Valley 99s at the Winter Workshop Irene Engard

Who knew that there is so much talent in a chapter with only 29 members. The SWS Winter Workshop was an excellent day looking back at the trailblazers that completed many "firsts" for us, listening to present day opportunities to work in the world of aviation, and learning ways to inspire and influence our aviation future.

The Past

Presenter Barbara Schultz (author, historian, AV 99) introduced us to over 40 women who influenced the evolution of aviation history. From Madeleine Sophie Blanchard, the first Professional woman balloonist (1819), to Navy Lt. Madeline Swegle, the first black female tactical air pilot (2020).



We learned some fun facts, like the four female pilots (all 99s) who were hired in 1939 to go on tour and promote the movie TAIL SPIN along with actresses described as "these air-minded lovelies representing the studio".

We also learned about Gladys Ingle, licensed in 1921, who was the only female member of the 13 Black Cats stunt pilots. (Take some time to look up her

1926 mid-air wheel change; the video is amazing.) Additionally, we learned about Sister Mary Aquinas Kinskey, a true "Flying Nun" (1947), and Nellie Zabel Willhite, the first deaf person to work as a commercial pilot (1944) carrying airmail. Nellie also worked as a barnstormer, specializing in flour bombing and balloon racing. And, we continued to learn about SOOOO many more firsts.


The Present

Presenter Carrie Worth (Research Pilot/Deputy Chief Pilot, AV99) let us know about the fabulous job she has with NASA Armstrong Flight Research Center. She flew for the military, got out and flew for UPS, lost her FAA medical, but now flies on an NASA medical. Did you know the FAA, DOD, and NASA each have their own flight medical certification? She gets to be part of NASA Armstrong Mission of "advancing technology and science though flight." The TG-14, G-IV, DC-8, C-20A, B200 King Air, and SOFIA have been part of her experience at NASA. It is amazing what these airplanes can do.

Presenter Lindsay Plein (ATC, AV 99) explained the Air TraUic Organization. She works at ARTCC Los Angeles (Air Route TraUic Control Center), your enroute guide. Los Angeles ARTCC is one of 22 centers. Lindsay loves her career. She says it is a good place to work, has good pay, and good pension benefits. They are hiring (https://www.faa.gov/be-atc), but you must get hired before your 31st birthday.

Presenter Nell Justice (757-767 Captain, UPS-Retired, and an

AV 99) shared the path she followed to get hired in 1994 by UPS. She encouraged each one of us to maintain persistence while reaching for our goals.




The Future


Presenter Kathleen Fredette (Director of STEAM initative, iLEAD, and an AV 99) introduced us to the iLEAD student aerospace projects. We learned about the Soaring Aeronautics Glider student aerospace project, introducing elementary and junior high students to the principles of flight using gliders. iLEAD Lancaster DreamUP to Space learners were selected to send their science experiments to the International Space Station.

Presenter Helida Vanhoy (Manager, Air and Space STEM Outreach, Edwards Air Force Base, and an AV 99) exposed us to many of the programs used for the base STEM program. We were provided with the materials to conduct our own glider flight control experiment. Once our balsa glider was assembled, we could use Post-It Notes on the control surfaces, adjusting them and noting the aUects on flight. We were also led to several resource sites, including the Air Force Materiel Command (afmc.af.mil), Air & Space STEM Outreach (dafstem.us) and where to find Air Force Civilian Service jobs (afciviliancareer.com).





Presenter Ellen Williams-Waldmiller (STEM Educator, retired, and an AV 99) shared her experiences teaching STEM. We participated in an exercise to demonstrate following directions and communication skills. We partnered and were instructed to explain to our partner how to fold a paper glider without showing them the instructions. Kim Ernst



(Fullerton 99) was my partner and she successfully instructed me on folding our airplane. (Try enlarging these and see how you do.)

We were provided many handouts for STEM education, including the Glider Flight Controls experiment, how to make a wind tube, and The Egg Drop Challenge. Our day ended with lots of STEM hands-on activities. Did you want to build something electrical choosing from over 100 snap circuit projects? How about making a circuit that launches a fan blade to simulate a flying saucer? Or, experience flying in the simulator? Perhaps build a stomp rocket then test its ability to fly? What fun!

Each presenter was so enthusiastic about her topic that you left with renewed excitement about the future of aviation and the power we as Ninety-Nines have in influencing all sectors of aviation.



In Remembrance of Cecile Schwebel Hatfield (1931-2025)



Cecile Schwebel Hatfield, has completed her final journey. A trailblazing aviator and attorney, she shattered glass ceilings in both aviation and law.

Her aviation passion ignited dramatically in 1962. Just two months after her son's birth, she confronted her fear of flying at Miami's Opa Locka airport. Her flight instructor had previously co-piloted for Amelia Earhart—a fitting connection to our organization's roots. Within a year, she earned her private pilot's license and ground-school instructor certificate.

Cecile became a prominent member of The Ninety-Nines, International Organization of Women Pilots, serving as our legal counsel for decades. She participated in the Intercontinental Women's Air Derby, serving as an unofficial goodwill ambassador, even delivering presidential letters across the Western Hemisphere. Her flying was so impressive that Vice President Hubert Humphrey once offered her a job as his personal pilot.

Professionally, Cecile's legal career was equally remarkable. She served nine years in the U.S. Department of Justice, leading complex air carrier lawsuits and overseeing aviation attorneys at the Federal Aviation Administration. Her landmark Supreme Court case, Varig v. United States (1984), remains a critical legal reference addressing the discretionary function exception to the Federal Tort Claims Act.

She was a groundbreaking first: the first woman to chair the American Bar Association's Aviation and Space Law Committee and the first woman to serve as Associate General Counsel for Piper Aircraft Corporation.

Her achievements were widely recognized. The International Association of Women in Aviation honored her with the 2015 Aviation Industry Woman of Excellence Award. Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University established the Award for Excellence in Aviation Law in her name.

She later turned her focus to aviation, becoming a flight instructor and serving in World War II as a WAFS and WASP pilot, ferrying military aircraft such as the P-38 and P-51. After the war, she dedicated herself to educating and mentoring future pilots, leaving an indelible mark on aviation history.

A devoted member of The Ninety-Nines, Iris was a champion for women in flight, breaking barriers and inspiring generations. As she takes her final flight, she joins her fellow pilots in the 6th Ferrying Group, leaving behind a legacy that will continue to inspire.

LEGAL CORNER: SCHOLARSHIP QUESTIONS

Question: Requesting confirmation as to whether a chapter is allowed to offer a scholarship exclusively to its members. For example, if the XX Chapter offers a \$2000 scholarship for a student pilot, could the criteria specify that the applicant must be a member of XX chapter?

Response:

The Ninety Nines Scholarship Guidelines (the "Guidelines") do not permit a chapter to limit scholarship qualification to the chapter's members. The Guidelines, published in 2021 (and found in The 99s library), address scholarship award criteria and publication. To comply with the Guidelines, a chapter should make individual scholarships available to a wider audience, such as by enlarging the geographic area, or allowing male or female applicants.

This answer is based on our review of IRS law and explained below.

- The Internal Revenue Code (IRC) requires scholarship grants to individuals are compliant with charitable
 requirements in order not to be considered a taxable expenditure. Those requirements require the scholarship to
 achieve a specific objective, such as improve a skill of the grantee, and require that it be awarded on an objective
 basis.
- 2. The IRS does not have hard and fast rules about the size of the class of scholarship applicants, so it is left to the organization to defend its scholarship awards based on the criteria it used for the selection. The potential universe of beneficiaries should be sufficiently large enough to rebut any allegations of self-dealing. That means that funds raised cannot be directed to benefit preselected or targeted members. This is highly subjective, and there isn't a magic number that works for this. It's more about making sure what we're providing isn't considered prohibited private benefit because the candidate pool only includes a handful of members or those somehow related to insiders of the nonprofit.
- 3. The Guidelines affirm: "chapters with individual scholarship programs must be very careful to assure that their program is one which is made available to a wide range of applicants NOT just chapter members." The Guidelines also provide that if scholarships are being distributed to both men and women, they may be limited to a designated geographic area. If the scholarship is limited to women pilots or students only, then they should be advertised to a wider geographic area.
- 4. The Guidelines provide methods of demonstrating that our scholarship program doesn't create unfair advantages. It is imperative that we take measures to ensure that members cannot privately benefit from the selection process, and the Guidelines require that "[y]our proposed scholarship guidelines should be reviewed by general counsel and/or the 501(c)(3) committee before finalizing them."
- 5. There is a concern that donors may be discouraged by the requirements for broad audiences for scholarships, in that the donors may want to limit scholarships to a chapter because they have personal ties to it. If this is the case, the chapter may set up other objective criteria for awards and then submit its strategy for review. The way to ensure this is to have legal or the 501(c) committee review.
